economic success, how would you propose we solve the revenue shortfall needs for transportation? Answer: I understand that every \$1 billion dollars invested in transportation creates about 19,000 new jobs while improving our quality of life. But, current revenue projects will provide \$2.5 billion per year less than what is needed to accommodate future growth and deliver goods and services by 2035. First, I would ensure the raiding of HURF monies is stopped. Secondly, I would look at increasing the gas tax (which has remained flat at 18 cents per gallon for the last 25 years) and licensing fees on alternative fuel vehicles, only after plugging some of the \$13 billion in of corporate tax loopholes. I'd like to see a bipartisan commission work with state auditors to determine which loopholes are not giving us a return on investment, and stop giving away those monies. I'd also like to put a temporary hold on all new loopholes until this process is completed. If we can find \$1-\$2 billion in regained revenues through this process, we will be able to build our transportation infrastructure in a collaborative way with our counties and cities.
